## **ABOUT THE COURSE**

# **Course Purpose**

To enable future media professionals to correctly interpret and communicate numbers.

# **Course Description**

This course in numeracy applies math and statistics to common situations faced in advertising, broadcasting, journalism and public relations. It is open to any major and is especially appropriate for those who insist they're "not good at math." No pre-requisite.

#### **Course Structure**

This is a "flipped" course. In a traditional course, the classroom is for instruction and homework is for practice. This course flips that model: You receive instruction online (videos and readings) on your own and come to class to do "homework" problems.

## **Objectives**

By the end of the course, you should be able to:

- Appraise the validity of common statements using numbers.
- Communicate numbers and statistics to a mass media audience.
- Describe the benefits and limitations of common statistical terms and methods.
- Dissect and summarize public opinion polls.
- Distinguish between random events and meaningful patterns.
- Evaluate assertions about causation, evidence, theory and risk.
- Interpret tables, charts and data visualizations.
- Simplify and contextualize large or complicated numbers.

# **Simple Calculator Allowed**
