Course Description

The purpose of this course is to provide aspiring sports media professionals with the basic skills necessary to produce videos in a multi-media, multi-platform work environment. The course combines informative lectures with hands-on activities and assignments to allow you to develop some video production skills. You will leave the course equipped with sharpened storytelling skills and basic shooting and editing abilities, which are increasingly necessary to begin a career in the sports media industry.

Course Objectives

This class is about sports video production. The overall objective for this class is for you to learn how to function as a production professional in the 2020s.

As such, by the end of the semester, you should be able to:

1. Recognize and apply the production process. (Modules 1-12)
2. Successfully produce a few videos, which you will have filmed and edited yourself. (Modules 3, 4, 6-10, 12)
3. Apply insights about the sports production industry to your work. (Modules 1-12)
4. Demonstrate your story idea-generating, newsgathering, interviewing, and reporting skills. (Module 12)

Course structure and policies

The course has 12 modules: four, including the first three, are two-week modules and eight are one-week modules.

- In each module, we use video lectures and online resources to teach you valuable skills for your future career in the sports media industry. Practice activities and one or two assignments per module will help you develop and hone those skills.
- Discussions are due on Wednesdays followed by responses to classmates two days later. Most practice exercises and activities are due on Tuesday nights (though there are a couple of exceptions).
- Assignments and projects are due on Friday nights with a 24-hour grace period. This means that as long as you turn in your work by Saturday night, you will receive full credit. The deadline is written as Friday because I do not guarantee any answers to questions received after business hours on Friday. **Only assignments and projects have a 24-hour grace period.** Activities, discussions or practice exercises all have hard deadlines.

As this is an online class, you are responsible for observing all posted due dates, and are encouraged to be self-directed and take responsibility for your learning.

Course Pacing

Each activity and assignment has a deadline by which you should turn in your work. Note that you can always turn in your work early. In fact, you are **highly encouraged** to work days –or even weeks if you so wish– ahead of time.

Let's put it that way:

*If I were a student in that class, I would try to turn in my work
at least 48 hours ahead of the deadline.*

Why? Because deadlines are firm and technical issues happen more or less often depending on the equipment used, luck, and a variety of other factors. **Getting your work done early gives you a chance to fix any potential technical problems and still turn something in by the deadline.**

Grading Policy

I will make every effort to have 10-point exercises and activities graded within 24-48 hours of you turning them in. For longer assignments and projects, my goal is to give you feedback within 48-72 hours.

Grades

You can earn up to 1,000 points in this course through participation, assignments, one quiz, and projects. Here is the breakdown of your grade:

- Participation: 150 pts
 - Three discussions worth 10 points each for a total of 30 points.
 - Thirteen practice exercises worth 10 points each. Your lowest score will be dropped for a total of 120 points.
- Assignments: 500 pts
 - Eleven assignments for 50 points each. Your lowest score will be dropped.
- Quiz: 50 pts
 - One quiz about fundamentals in Module 1 worth 50 points.
- Projects: 300 pts
 - Three projects, including the final project, worth 100 points each.
