Course Description and Prerequisites

Course Description: In this course, the students will learn public interest communications theories and their strategic applications to practice. In addition, the students will be introduced to professional resources in public interest communications related to theory and strategic application. By the end of this course, the students will understand the major areas of public interest communications theory and how those areas have been developed through empirical research.
