**Course Overview** 

This course examines the relationship between media and society through the global lens of sport. Students will explore how sports media reflect and influence issues like migration, capitalism, and political systems worldwide. Emphasis is placed on developing critical thinking, writing, and multimedia skills while analyzing how journalism frames sports and public perception. The course also introduces career paths in the global sport industry and highlights the impact of globalization on domestic sports media. By the end, students will understand the international diversity of sport coverage and be equipped to create content from a global, informed perspective.

#### **Course Objectives**

- 1. Develop critical thinking skills about the impact media have had on societies (and vice-versa) through a unique lens: sport
- 2. Explain and think critically about international issues, including but not limited to the influence of media on societies, migration, the global economy, capitalism and other political systems, etc.
- 3. Demonstrate understanding of the careers that are available in the global sport industry
- 4. Demonstrate ability to generate content, including effective writing and multimedia skills, from a global perspective
- 5. Understand how sports journalism frames our understanding of sports.

6. Be able to critically analyze the impact of globalization on their domestic sports media industry, and have developed an understanding of the international diversity in coverage of sport

### <u>Assignment Descriptions</u>

#### Class and Excursion Attendance, Participation and Citizenship (4 weeks, 7.5 pts per

week) – This includes, but is not limited, to the following: regular and on-time attendance for class and required group excursions; serious preparation of the assigned texts; active listening, including note-taking; involvement in classroom and outside of classroom activities; posting relevant content to Canvas, questions & comments on the course forums; being respectful of others; and, a program-long sustained effort at contributing to the program discussion through visible attention, helpful questions and worthwhile insights into the issues being discussed.

- **Wimbledon Group Project (45 points) -** Students will be assigned a subject around tennis/Wimbledon to research and present in class.

There are various Al detection tools available (built within Canvas and externally such as ZeroGPT), and many Al platforms follow very formulaic response patterns. If I am concerned that your work is not your own, I will try to verify the originality of your work and if evidence is found that your work is Al-generated I will submit your assignment as violating the honor code.
