COURSE OBJECTIVE Lighting for Film and Video is intended to give career-path production students an introduction to lighting and the image, lighting equipment and tonality of light.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of the semester, the student should be able to:

- 1) Indentify lighting techniques on screen.
- 2) Indentify and adjust color temperature of lighting instruments.
- 3) Indentify and comprehend strengths and weaknesses of lighting instruments.
- 4) Use grip and electrical equipment safely and effectively.
- 5) Control light, fill, negative fill and spill
- 6) Indentify and use lighting ratios for dramatic effect
- 7) Offer constructive feedback of your own work and that of peers.

### **IN-CLASS RECORDING**

Students are allowed to record video or audio of class lectures. However, the purposes for which these recordings may be used are strictly controlled. Th only allowable purposes are (1) for personal education use, (2) in connection with a complaint to the university, or (3) as evidence in, or in preparation for, a criminal or civil proceeding. All other purposes are prohibited. Specifically, students may not publish recorded lectures without the written consent of the instructor. A "class lecture" is an educational presentation intended to inform or teach enrolled students about a particular subject, including any instructor-led discussions that form part of the presentation, and deliver by an instructor hired or appointed by the University, or by a guest instructor, as part of a University of Florida course. A class lecture does not include lab sessions, student presentations, clinical presentation such as patient history, academic exercises involving solely student participation, assessments (quizzes, tests, exams), field trips, private conversations between students in the class or between a student and the faculty or guest lecturer during a class session. Publication without permission of the instructor is prohibited. To "publish" means to share, transmit, circulate, distribute, or provide access to a recording, regardless, of format or medium, to another person (or persons), including but not limited to another student within the same class section. Additionally, a recording, or transcript of a recording, is considered published if it is posted on or uploaded to, in whole or in part, any media platform, including but not limited to social media, book, magazine, newspaper, leaflet, or third-party note/tutoring services. A student who publishes a recording without written consent may be subject to a civil cause of action instituted by a person injured by the publication and/or discipline under UF Regulation 4.040 Student Honor Code and Student Conduct Code.
