COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Students will continue to build on their live play-by-play broadcasting and color commentary skills, further developing their voice as an instrument, as well as produce events and social media content.

PREREQUISITES:

RTV 3945 - Intro to OBSN

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Basic ability to announce and produce live sports events. **Researching and preparing are essential.** Appreciation of skills required for professional sports broadcasting. Game broadcasts will be listened to on Tuesdays and students will receive 'constructive criticism' during class.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Objectives and goals of the experience include:	
•	Do research to prepare for each broadcast, including pregame and postgame

- Hone broadcast storytelling skills, using sources and data to support the information presented.
- Develop sports broadcasting performance techniques for roles of live event play-by-play, color analyst and producing.
- Learn how to keep score of games to add production value.
- Develop sports broadcasting production and producing techniques.
- Think outside the box, and think on your feet

Requirements

All students must meet the following requirements to pass this experience and earn credit. This is designed to give the student a wide-ranging set of opportunities throughout the experience. Each student is required to broadcast a minimum of five (5) games during the semester, including one full game of play-by-play. You will also need two professional critiques of your work (details TBA) and compile a :60-:90 reel of your best material by the end of the semester.

Producer

All students are required to produce one (1) game broadcast in its entirety. This will count toward your five games. The producer position requires the student to set up the broadcast gear and break down the gear after the broadcast is complete, fully produce the halftime show including two (2) produced segments, give live updates of college scoreboard (SEC, followed by Top 25), and executing spot breaks for the entire broadcast. Other duties include spotting, providing statistical information in-game to broadcast crew, etc.

Play-by-play and/or Color

You will be required to provide play-by-play for a minimum of one (1) full game. Practicing PBP and Color (Reps, reps, reps), whether you are new to the experience or a veteran, is always important, as well as going back to listen to the prerecorded broadcasts (self-critique is essential). The bulk of these broadcasts will be conducted from the broadcast studio.

Professional Critique (2 total)

Connecting with professionals and alums (I will provide you with contact info), you will get two critiques. You will need to submit a short clip of a game to them and get feedback.

Reel (:60-:90)

As you know by now, getting jobs in this business requires a demo reel – a sample of your work. You should already be updating these often, and this is a little encouragement to do so.

A student who publishes a recording without written consent may be subject to a civil cause of action instituted by a person injured by the publication and/or discipline under UF Regulation 4.040 Student Honor Code and Student Conduct Code.
