COURSE OBJECTIVE

The goal of this class is to help students acquire the basic knowledge, skills, and work ethic of motion picture production. Students will learn the multiple positions of an industry standard film set and will produce three 8-10 minute short films. Every student will play the role of one Above the Line team member (Producer, Director, Cinematographer, Production Designer, Editor) and two Below the Line team members (1st assistant director, 2nd Assistant Director, Script Supervisor, Camera Operator, 1st Assistant Camera, 2nd Assistant Camera, Sound Mixer, Boom Operator, Gaffer and Key Grip).

Students will learn the intricate roles and duties in making a film from breaking down a script to recording sound on a sound mixer. You will learn introductory knowledge of shot composition, storyboarding, and editing. In this class you will be work to perfect those skills in a collaborative setting.

Grade of C in RTV3320 and instructor permission
