

# Writing Fundamentals

## MMC2121

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### DESCRIPTION

Clear, confident writing is a skill that will support you in every academic, professional, and creative setting. This course is designed to strengthen your understanding of English grammar while helping you develop a writing style that feels both effective and authentically your own. Whether you want to avoid common errors, polish your essays, or communicate with more precision, you will gain practical tools you can apply immediately in your writing.

Throughout the course, you will learn how sentences work—from the parts of speech to the mechanics that hold ideas together. You will practice identifying and correcting common issues such as run-on sentences, fragments, unclear pronouns, misplaced modifiers, and lack of parallel structure. Special attention is paid to punctuation—including commas, dashes, semicolons, apostrophes, quotation marks, and colons—so you can use these tools confidently and correctly.

As your technical skills grow, you will also work on expressing ideas clearly, concisely, and with purpose. You will experiment with tone, rhythm, and sentence variety to build a personal writing voice that strengthens your storytelling and increases reader engagement. Additional topics include choosing the right word (such as affect/effect and fewer/less), understanding subject-verb and pronoun-antecedent agreement, and avoiding vague, ambiguous, or overly passive constructions.

Finally, you will explore how AI tools can support—or complicate—your writing and editing process, learning strategies for using technology responsibly and effectively.

By the end of the course, you will be able to write with greater accuracy, clarity, correctness, and confidence, and you will have a toolkit of strategies to continue growing as a writer.

### LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- Use correct sentence structure, punctuation and word usage in your writing
- Identify common grammatical errors and be able to correct them
- Write clearly, concisely and accurately
- Develop a personal writing voice, using tone, rhythm and sentence variety to enhance storytelling and reader engagement

## COURSE STRUCTURE

This is an asynchronous online class. Lectures are on videos that you can watch at your convenience. However, there will be opportunities throughout the semester to connect with us via Zoom for some live review **sessions**. You are expected to read the announcements each week and to check into class several times a week to make sure you don't miss anything.

**For the grammar portion:** The course has **12 modules** that are equivalent to what would occur in a regular 50-minute class period. Within the modules, you will have lecture videos to watch, textbook readings to complete and activities to do. For the first six modules, you will focus on learning grammar and punctuation rules.

- There are **three tests that cover two modules each**.
- After finishing the first six modules, you will take a **Grammar exam**. You will have two attempts on this exam, and only the highest score counts.

**For the writing portion:** The course has **5 modules** focused on improving your writing skills. The modules include videos with writing advice and tips. After each video, you will take a quiz over the lecture and textbook material. You are expected to review the lecture and complete the readings before taking the quizzes. In addition, there are two writing assignments that allow you to practice your skills. You will participate in peer critiques to get feedback on your writing and to gain experience with editing other people's work.

## ASSIGNMENTS

- **Grammar Pretest/Posttest:** The grammar pretest helps you get a grasp on how well you know grammar before the course really takes off. You will retake a similar quiz at the end of the semester so that you can see your growth.
- **Modules & Quizzes:** You will complete modules every week and then take quizzes. The **Grammar Practice Quizzes** are for practice only and are not graded. You can take these quizzes multiple times. The Grammar Graded Quizzes are for points. You can retake these quizzes up to 10 times. Only the highest score counts. The **Writing Module Quizzes** are graded and cover material from the lectures and textbook.
- **Grammar Tests:** There are three tests to help you prepare for the Grammar Exam. These tests cover the grammar and punctuation rules from the module content. You need to take all three tests. These tests will be proctored by HonorLock. The tests have 25 questions each, and you will have 40 minutes to complete them. *The lowest of the three tests scores is dropped.*
- **Grammar Exam:** After all six grammar modules have been covered, you will take an exam. This grammar exam will be proctored through ProctorU. *You can take the grammar exam twice. The highest score is counted.* You will have 60 minutes to answer 40 questions worth 5 points each. The grammar exam makes up almost one-third of your grade for the grammar portion of the course, so please spend time preparing.
- **Discussion posts:** You will earn points by posting to the discussion board during the semester. One of these posts allows you to share a practice writing assignment with your classmates. You will also create a grammar meme, try to spot spelling errors in an article and contemplate the use of AI.
- **Assignments:** The assignments include a comma quiz and a posttest. In addition, you will also write an anecdote. This is a timed writing assignment that will be proctored by Honorlock. You will have an hour to write an anecdote. The prompt will be provided. You will also work on writing an email and will be asked to use AI and make comparisons between your original work and what AI creates.

## LATE POLICY

Deadlines are firm. Check the Course calendar and/or announcements regularly to ensure you don't miss an assignment.

**Each day a submission is late, there will be an automatic letter grade deduction. After five days, the assignment will receive a 0.**

***No work is accepted after the last day of class. No Exceptions.***
